Baptism's Comfort from Cradle to Crown

"Why do you baptize babies?" Have you gotten the question before? Some won't even use the word baptize. They'll say, "Why do you sprinkle babies?" They won't use the term baptize because they claim it's not a valid baptism unless the person *chooses* it for himself.

Right-Hearted, Wrong-Headed

As off-guard as they may have caught you, we must admit this about the person them: they are right-hearted, but wrong-headed. They want to remain true to God's Word, which says that one can only be saved *through faith*. Sadly, they end up exalting human reason above God's Word when they ask, "How is it possible for a baby to have faith in Jesus?" Perhaps even more sad, they lose out on the great comfort the Sacrament gives.

How Do We Respond?

One certainly could reference passages that teach that little children *can believe*—and we should! But perhaps what gets even closer to the heart of the issue is to ask, *"who are we to say that faith and mental understanding are one and the same?"* To say that a baby must mentally comprehend the gospel is to say more than Scriptures say about faith or baptism.

A Misuse of Human Reason

If God in his Word says, "baptism saves you" (Titus 3:5; 1 Peter 3:21), who are we to misuse human reason and say that must mean "only adults

who choose to be baptized"? If God in his Word says, "Surely I was sinful at birth, sinful from the time my mother conceived me" (Psalm 51:5), who are we to add to Scripture and say that children are innocent until they reach an "age of accountability." If God in his Word says that baptism gives "forgiveness of sins" (Acts 2:38), who are we to withhold this great blessing from babies? Again, these are all examples of elevating human reason above God's clear Word.

Perhaps the question should be turned around. "Why don't you baptize infants?" Since, in addition to what we've said so far, God's Word nowhere tells us not to baptize babies, the burden of proof is on those who refuse to. Why would we want to withhold from infants such blessings as God says baptism gives? And why would you ever want to withhold such a comfort from their parents?

God's Glory, Man's Comfort

One of the classic "Lutheran" tests of false or true teaching is this: which teaching gives God the greatest glory and man the greatest comfort? Infant baptism comes out on top in both respects! To see baptism as a choice only adults can make for themselves changes baptism from a sacrament (a work of God) to a sacrifice (a work of man). That means diminished glory to God

who alone saves and diminished comfort to man whose faith now turns inward to examine whether he/she was "sincere" in his/her baptism. There is much more we could say about this, but let us make one more connection of comfort in baptism.

Baptism's Comfort at the End of Life


Baptism brings great comfort not just for life's beginnings but also for life's endings. If, as some claim, faith and mental understanding of the gospel are synonymous, then what about the Christian with Alzheimer's or dementia? After all, they eventually lose their mental understanding of who Jesus is and what he has done to save them. Does their faith wane with their mental capacity and their memory of "choosing to believe"? This is where the true understanding of baptism shines once again! Baptism is God's work, not mine.

This is why baptism is so comforting to us who have loved ones in memory care. At life's beginnings, what a comfort that my baby doesn't need to have mental understanding of the gospel to be forgiven and saved by Jesus! They are baptized! So at life's end, what a comfort that my loved one with Alzheimer's doesn't need to have mental understanding of the gospel to be forgiven and saved by Jesus! They are baptized! All of God's promises attached to baptism are theirs!

Emblazoned Blessings

Even into the later stages of diseases of the memory, some Christians can sing along to Jesus Loves Me or Abide With Me, pray along with the Lord's Prayer, say John 3:16, confess together the Apostles' Creed, the Confession of Sins and other parts of the Liturgy. What a blessing toward life's end to speak and sing God's truths emblazoned on the mind and heart from earlier on.

What an even greater blessing God's Sacrament of baptism emblazoned on the soul—a baptism that leaves our faith and salvation up to God and his work—a baptism that carries us from this life's end to the next life's beginning—a life with Christ that will never end. Baptism truly gives us comfort from cradle to crown!

TREASURER

Fiscal Year 7/16 to 6/17

June ended the fiscal year to date (FYTD) with \$2,284,286 in total income with expected budget income to be \$2,181,193 which was \$103,093 above budget. Clear the Path was \$232,554 over budget which was the biggest reason we were over budget on income. Envelope Offerings are -\$85,647 less than budgeted. Expenses (FYTD) were \$2,380,551 which gave us a FYTD of a negative -\$96,265. All bills are paid to date. We owe \$0 to our special funds account. Special Funds Account available balance is \$38,000. Clear the Path matching funds which we budgeted for is 232,554 above budget income. Total Clear the Path contributions as of 6-30-2017 totaled \$1,352,445 which were paid directly to reduce our loan balance down to \$0.


the chance!

Heading to China recently with a group from St Croix Lutheran High School brought two of my passions together in one...I love to travel and I love to teach. We were headed to an English camp that brought Chinese students from great distances away. The purpose of the camp was to help these students improve their English skills.



Getting an opportunity to travel to China and be able to teach was challenging, but very, very rewarding. As we prepared for this trip, my niece and I were given the responsibility to teach Science to students between the ages of 8-16. There is no gift that we can offer anyone greater than the gift of Jesus.

We completed our camp by singing, "Jesus Loves Me". The joy that all of us felt that day was indescribable! The following day we visited a buddhist temple. That truly brought me to tears. Seeing people of all ages offering incense and prayers to a god that does not exist. No joy. No peace. No hope.

The trip helped me to refocus my personal mission and the purpose of each and every Christian. Please pray with me that more and more people of China and every

I love having lunch with them years after they leave my classroom and going to their weddings. (I jokingly tell them in class that I will gladly sing a medley of my greatest hits at their weddings. Fortunately, no one has ever asked...) I love the spiritual connection we share at our schools.

I am grateful for the opportunity to serve at Crown of Life and pray God will bless our ministry together.
