Love Does Not...

Did you know that when the Apostle Paul spoke about love and the qualities of love, he mostly talked about things that love wasn't going to do? In the great love chapter of the bible (1 Corinthians 13) you will find that there are eight "negatives" listed verses four "positives" in what love is all about. Most of the time, then, Paul began by saying LOVE DOES NOT... Let's take a closer look at a couple of his "negatives."

Paul said that *love is not* self seeking. Part of our sinful nature is wanting to have our own way. One well-known theologian has said, *cure selfishness and you have just replanted the garden of Eden*. Adam and Eve rejected God's way so that they could have their own way, didn't they? Their "self" replaced God and His will. Exalting your "self" is the opposite of righteousness and the opposite of love at the same time. Love does not get preoccupied with its own interests, but instead takes an active interest in others.

The folks in the Corinthian congregation were a pretty good example of that. They were extreme examples of what love should not be. They would have been terrible at a pot luck dinner because they didn't want to share any of their food at their "love feasts" as they were called – their fellowship get-togethers. They protected their rights to the point of suing their fellow believers in open court among the pagans, and many other things. Paul was very direct with them. "Love does not do these things." Love is not all about me. It's a sin we struggle with, too.

Or consider another "negative" from Paul: love does not keep a record of wrongs. The verb there in the original Greek language looks like this: logizomai. It means "to take into account." It's actually a bookkeeping term that means "to calculate or to reckon." It was used when you were trying to figure out an entry on a ledger. The purpose of an entry is to make a permanent record that can be consulted whenever you need it. In the business world, that kind of a practice is absolutely necessary. In personal matters it's not only unnecessary – it's very harmful. Dwelling on past sins, keeping a record of wrongs will destroy you from the inside out and it will do great harm to the people you are keeping records on.

Is that your struggle? Is your first reaction when you don't get your way is to say, "well, what comes around goes around. Just wait until you want my help with something or you want my support. I won't forget this?" It's not that difficult to find our guilt in all of this, is there?

Did you know that the same Greek word, logizomai, "to take into account," is used often in the New Testament to represent the pardoning act of God because of Jesus' saving work? In the book of Romans Paul quoted the Psalms and said, blessed is the man whose sin the Lord will never count against him. In the book of 2 Corinthians Paul said, God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ, not counting men's sins against them. In the book of Acts Peter said in a sermon, repent, then, and turn to God, so that your sins may be wiped out. That's a pretty great accounting system that God has in place, isn't it? Once Jesus Christ paid for our sins on the cross there is no more record of it. It is blotted out - "wiped away" – as Peter put it. As your name appears in God's heavenly record there is only one entry after your name.

It says, "righteous." We are counted righteous in Christ. He was the one who never kept a record of wrongs; he was never out to seek His own interests and give in to selfishness. Jesus lived a righteous life in every way. His righteousness, his moral perfection, was credited as our moral perfection. No other record exists for us in God's ledger. Jesus made sure of that.

And it's that love of Jesus that motivates us to put His kind of love into practice – the kind of love that keeps no record of wrongs. No wrongs are recorded in our minds for later reference. Love forgives. Someone once suggested that love does not forgive and forget, but rather love remembers everything and still forgives. Resentment is careful to keep the books on wrongs, which it reads over and over again, hoping for a chance to get even. Love keeps no books, because it has no place for resentment and grudges.

An old theologian once said that a wrong done against love is like a spark that falls into the sea and is immediately quenched. Love drowns wrongs rather than records them. As we remember how God completely and permanently erased the record of our sins against Him, it motivates us to forgive and forget the much lesser wrongs that people do against us.

Love does not. Paul knew that the "negatives" of your life of love are just as important as the positives. With the Lord's help, show your love to everyone by what you will not do. You will not let selfishness get the best of you. And you will not keep a record of wrongs. Jesus empowers you with his love and forgiveness to refrain from those very things. God bless us to that end. Happy Valentines Day!


"The Well"

Identity in Culture: How Our Personal Identities Affect the Way We Treat Others

The protests and violence over the inauguration weekend really struck me. One of the boasts of our country and our generation is that we are inclusive. And yet with all the riots, name calling, mocking, hate-speech, etc...that we have seen over the past months and years, it seems like we aren't as inclusive as we'd like to think we are. What has lead us to this point in history where we hear cries of "Peace! Love! Acceptance!" But then we see and hear in the news that there has been another mass shooting, another riot gone bad, another person killed because of their personal beliefs. Even Christians are guilty of crying out "Peace! Love! Acceptance!" And then are heard saying things quite the opposite, posting things far from it, and withholding prayers for it. How have we gotten to this point? Our personal identities are huge factors in the way we treat other people.

Identity Formation

At its core, identity formation can take place in two different ways...outward or inward. We can gain a sense of purpose and meaning from either outward circumstances influences, or we can try to find it inwardly. Let's briefly consider each.

Outward identity formation takes place in many traditional cultures. The sense of self and worth is dictated to you by others, and often times by your family. Imagine a young boy whose name is Tom Baker. His father, grandfather, and great-grandfather before him were all bakers, the best in the village. The gift of baking ran through their blood and everyone knew it. Everyone came to them for their bread and pastries. As a young Tom felt immense pressure to live up to the Baker name. If he didn't then his whole life would be a failure. That's how outward identity formation works. It is constantly looking to others for a sense of purpose and worth. It needs affirmation from something outside of itself.

Even though that isn't the primary form of identity formation within our

ASK THE PASTOR – Can you guess which pastor is which?

What was the one definitive moment in your life that led you to pursue becoming a Pastor? Why did you choose to head in this direction after this moment?

I'm not sure that there was a definitive moment, but there were many moments where teachers, parents and friends took the time to pull me aside and tell me that they could see that I had gifts and talents for being a Pastor. That meant a lot. I suppose that once I came to the end of my college career I was determined to be a Pastor. All of the Greek and Hebrew studies were much less intimidating and I was ready to get serious about pursuing ministry as a profession. I suppose that my graduation from college was my "moment" where I thought that, perhaps, being a Pastor was the best way to use the skills God had given me.

There isn't a definitive moment that led me to pursue being a pastor. I will say that after I spent my apprentice year (called the vicar year) in Las Vegas, I fell in love with serving the Lord in the Ministry of His Word. I chose that direction because I fell in love with people. I loved every day getting up working with God's word and leading people to God's word. It is a joy to see the power of God's word working in people's heart and I wouldn't trade that for anything in the world. God and His people are the reasons I chose to become a pastor.

How many times did you think you were on the wrong path or wanted to give up? Why didn't you?

For the first few years of college, the thought crossed my mind many times to maybe transfer to a different school and pursue something else. But the Lord blessed me with some really great friends and a really great big brother who would pick me up when I was frustrated and encourage me to keep going because they could see that the Lord could really use me for His Church. They were all so great to have around!

While I certainly am aware of my shortcomings and recognize that I am not a perfect pastor, I haven't really looked back. It's dangerous to play the "What would I do if I weren't a pastor" game. Martin Luther talked about his ministry as his own little paradise. And thankfully up to this point, I can share his sentiment. The fact that God would use me, a sinner who daily makes silly mistakes, is truly remarkable. It is an undeserved gift and I truly feel humbled He would call me to be a Pastor.

Is becoming a Pastor what you thought it would be?

Yes - and no. Yes because I grew up in a Pastor's house and saw what my dad did every single day. But "no" because there is no possible way to anticipate all of the situations and challenges that pop up in the ministry. No two days are ever the same. That's what I enjoy!

I tried to keep expectations out of it heading in. I will say that compared to other jobs I have had in the past, it truly is the most draining, and yet rewarding of them all.

What is the most difficult part of being a Pastor and why?

For me, the most difficult part of ministry is also the most satisfying part. Counseling people and families is difficult sometimes because the answer to their challenges isn't always "clear cut." A Pastor also cares so much for the families under his care as their shepherd that it's painful to see the difficult situations and episodes that confront God's people. It's difficult - but very gratifying and rewarding when the advice, comfort and encouragement that I can provide from God's Word bears fruit and really helps someone and their family. It's the most wonderful feeling in the world!

Maybe the guilt. It's part of my nature to be somewhat of a perfectionist. But with the many different hats I wear I often times feel like I can't dedicate myself wholly to those different tasks. And so I often find myself thinking I could have done a better job with a sermon, planning, prep time Bible study, event, something i should have said or maybe I shouldn't have. I could and maybe should have spent more time with that straying member. What was I thinking?

I guess then what goes along with that is the practice of making sure I spend time in God's word each day. Without the message of freedom from guilt and oppression, ministry would be unbearable. What a great God we have who forgives us despite our failures. Glory to Him!

TREASURER – Fiscal Year 7/16 to 6/17

December ended the fiscal year to date (FYTD) with \$1,118,185 in total income with expected budget income to be \$1,060,768 (\$57,416 above budget). Clear the Path matching funds budgeted is \$86,813 above budget income. Envelope Offerings are -\$32,162 less than budgeted. Expenses (FYTD) were \$892,088 (FYTD of a positive \$225,336). This positive income includes the matching \$250,000 in December that will be paid out in January. We owe \$30,000 to our special funds account. Clear the Path contributions as of 12-31-16 totaled \$640,098 paid to reduce loan balance down to \$751.184. All bills are paid to date.
