New Beginnings

There is something deeply satisfying about a story or a movie ending in a happy way. Most people enjoy the protagonist of a story riding joyfully off into the sunset with no problems on the horizon. We love that picture. And yet, interestingly many movies don't receive awards for telling stories with joyful endings. It wasn't until he directed *Schindler's List* that Steven Spielberg finally received his first Oscar award. That movie has a far from happy ending as many holocaust victims line up to pay honor to the late Oskar Schindler. Many of the movies receiving the best picture award these days are much more raw and real and far from happy.

This illustrates an interesting dichotomy. We human beings would love things to be happy, but the reality is that they aren't always that way. J.R.R. Tolkien had an interesting take on this.

[T]he joy of the happy ending ... is not essentially "escapist" nor "fugitive." ... It does not deny the existence of dyscatastrophe, of sorrow and failure: the possibility of these is necessary to the joy of deliverance [eucatastrophe]; it denies (in the face of much evidence, if you will) universal final defeat, and in so far is evangelium, giving a fleeting glimpse of Joy, Joy beyond the walls of the world, poignant as grief.... When the sudden "turn" comes we get a piercing glimpse of joy, and heart's desire, that for a moment passes outside the frame, rends indeed the very web of story, and lets a gleam come through.

Tolkien is saying that deep in our hearts there is some shadow or glimpse of ultimate joy...a joy set there by the Creator. He goes on to point out that while the world is full of sorrow, danger and tragedy, there is underneath all of that pain a hope that we will end up eventually escaping it.

In Mark 16:1 it says, "When the Sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices so that they might go to anoint Jesus' body." For the women going to Jesus tomb early Sunday morning, the Sabbath wasn't just over, their hope was over. Jesus, they thought, would be the one to lead them away from this world full of sorrow, danger, and tragedy. But he was dead, in a tomb, not even properly buried...or so they thought.

This wasn't a sad ending. It was a happy one. Though it seemed like it, the death of Jesus wasn't where Jesus' work ended, and it's not where our joy ended. N.T. Wright put it this way in his book The Day the Revolution Began,

"As Jesus' followers looked back on that day in the light of what happened soon afterward, they came up with the shocking, scandalous, nonsensical claim that his death had launched a revolution. That something had happened that afternoon that had changed the world. That by six o'clock on that dark Friday evening, the world was a different place."

From the moment of the very first sin, and even before that, God had a plan in place that the world wouldn't end in sadness. The women walking to Jesus' tomb didn't comprehend what God really had in store.

As another school year comes to an end there are a lot of people who are going to be moving on. Moving on to a new grade, new school, a new job. We may be sad as we look back at the good memories of what has already taken place. We may look forward apprehensive about what is to come. But the resurrection of Jesus gives us comfort in either case. No, it's not a comfort that we will have only once we die and go to heaven. It's a comfort we have now.

How? Well, the story should have ended with you and I up on the cross, nails in our hands and feet, mocked for everyone to see, and eventually buried in a tomb we couldn't even call our own. But that's not how it ended up. Instead the Son of God in our place. His substitution reminds us that God does take pain, and sadness, sorrow, danger, and evil very seriously. So seriously that it cost the life of the Son of God to deal with it completely. Nothing short of the death of the Son of God could solve that problem. But again, even that's not where it ended. The happy ending of Jesus resurrection is so great it even drowns the sorrow of the cross.

Pain and loss are things that come with endings...the end of an era at school, the termination of a job, the loss of a loved one. But Jesus' death and resurrection remind us that those things aren't the end. Because of his death and resurrection we are reminded of a new beginning. Jesus is the cosmic solution to all our pain and suffering. When you are facing a particular reality of pain in your life, look to the even deeper reality of the new beginning Jesus has ALREADY given you. Only with her hope fixed on the reality of a baby child near on the horizon can a mother make it through the pains of childbirth. And only with our sure hope fixed on the reality of a new and living joy in heaven can we endure pains of this world.


With every movie that has an ending that gives you tears of joy, remember what Paul says in Romans 8:18 "I consider that our present sufferings are not worth comparing with the glory that will be revealed in us." Let every happy story line remind you of the unimaginable joy ready to be revealed for you when your ultimate new beginning takes place in Heaven.

Scholar N.T. Wright put a lot of time and Biblical research into this book. His primary thesis is that when Jesus died on the cross, he not only paid for our sins, but he also freed us to be who we were created to be. He emphasizes the vocation of being children of God as part of the work Jesus accomplished on the cross.

A scholarly piece of work, The Day the Revolution Began encourages the reader to see that at the cross Jesus made us new creatures and has given us the opportunity to be what God intended us to be. While it's an intellectually compelling read, I would caution the reader to not let the emphasis on the teaching of the new vocation created for us take away from the fact that Jesus did accomplish the forgiveness of sins.

A Culture Obsessed with Heroes

"Without selflessness there can be no heroism." When I heard that phrase I couldn't help but start thinking about heroism. I'm not the only one. We see heroes all over the place in our world. Some of the highest grossing movies over the past several years have been the Marvel movies. Walk down the children's toys isle in your local store and the number of toys revolving around those characters will shock you. Our culture is obsessed with heroes. Why is that?

Examining Heroism

On its surface, heroism seems very appealing to us. We love people standing up for their moral convictions even in the face of great oppression. But a deeper look at heroism leads to some puzzling findings.

Heroism demands selflessness. In every story, movie or book about heroes the main character is willing to sacrifice his or her own desires for the greater good. It's the ultimate act of selflessness to see the hero lay down their life for the sake of the people. Fighting for the greater good the hero will do whatever it takes to win the moral battle against the forces of evil. Without the hero's sacrifice there would be no heroism. Heroism demands sacrifice.

And while so many people in our culture are obsessed with the idea of heroism, it seems almost duplicitous for our culture. Personal sacrifice is not a part of our culture. Our culture is obsessed about the individual. See my notes about the Age of Enlightenment's effect on our culture's obsession with the individual in this post (Previous post on "Why Lives Matter"). Our culture is obsessed with individual rights. It glorifies the individual. Heroism is about an individual giving up his or her rights for the greater good of the many. Those two ideologies are completely contradictory and yet our culture is obsessed with them both! Is there any explanation for this schizophrenic culture we live in?

A Cosmic Need

One of the characteristics about heroes that we love is their unwavering

TREASURER Fiscal Year 7/16 - 6/17 March ended the fiscal year to date (FYTD) with \$1,596,460 in total income with expected budget income to be \$1,594,722 which was \$1,737 above budget. Envelope Offerings are -\$81,025 less than budgeted. Expenses (FYTD) were \$1,664,145 which gave us a FYTD of a negative -\$47,869. All bills are paid to date. Clear the Path matching funds which we budgeted for is \$46,530 above budget income. Total Clear the Path contributions as of 3-31-2017 totaled \$1,012,906 which were paid directly to reduce our loan balance down to \$374,226.


"Pete the Cat: I Love My White Shoes"


