Why Work?

"It is the working man who is the happy man."

It is the idle man who is the miserable man."

- Benjamin Franklin

Remember the 40 hour week? Whatever happened to that? "I worked a 60 hour week," has almost become the boast of this generation. Why is that? How did we get to this point in history when the amount of work we put in is equal to our self esteem? Work, like many other things, can become a personal spiritual crisis in our lives. Let's consider a short history of the cultural views of work.

The Cultures of Work

There is a famous Babylonian account of how the world was created. Marduk, one of the Babylonian gods, created the world after he split open the body of another god. When the other gods had seen the enormous creation they told Marduk that he created too much. "There's too much creation to take care of. There's too much work to do to preserve it all." This was their argument. And so Marduk responded, "'Let me put blood together, and make bones too. Let me set up primeval man: Man shall be his name. Let me create a primeval man. The work of the gods shall be imposed (on him), and so they shall be at rest." In this Eastern account of creation, work is seen as a horrible imposition of labor. Work is an evil.

What about Western accounts of creation? In Greek Mythology, Zeus gives Pandora, the first woman, a jar. He told her to not open the box...but she did. And what came out? Death, disease, all kinds of horror including...work! Even in Western mythology, work was evil.

ASK THE PASTOR

How do you console a friend who has had a unexpected family loss?

Whenever someone has gone through a major loss it is important to recognize that they are experiencing

some deep personal emotions. And because emotions are so high, it makes sharing comforting words such a difficult thing to do. If emotions are at such a high level, when someone asks, "Why would God do this to me?" they are not looking for a rational explanation concerning the theological reasons God allows suffering to happen. More than anything, they simply want the pain to go away. Unfortunately, we can't take the pain of the loss away. Here's a couple practical things we can do. 1) We can

be there for them. Years ago, a college student's father passed away. That student said, "When I lost my father, all I wanted was someone to be there for me when I fell asleep." We can do that. We can be there to put our arms around our friends and comfort them. 2) When they are ready to hear it, we can be prepared to remind them that God still loves us. We can point them to the cross where God not only answers all our questions, but reminds us of his love. Very briefly, two things can happen when people suffer. One is they can think, "I'm being punished." But the cross says, "No. Jesus took your punishment." The second question comes up, "Well, maybe God doesn't care." But the cross says "God does care. He's lost a child out of his love for you."

Living for Jesus - Stewardship Thought

Martin Luther said, "If someone would knock on my heart and ask, 'Who lives here?' I would say, 'Martin Luther once lived here, but he has moved out and Jesus has moved in." Martin Luther lived for Jesus. In Galatians 2:20 the apostle Paul wrote that he, too, lived for Jesus. "I have been crucified with Christ and I no longer live, but Christ lives in me. The life I live in the body, I live by faith in the Son of God."

Who or what do you live for? If we live for ourselves and the things of the world, we will focus our attention and energy on amassing more and more things. It is easy for money and possessions to become overly important because our society tells us that more is better and that happiness and success can only be achieved by having the newest and best things. To find happiness and success, we work long and hard.

King Solomon, who was wealthy and wise, tried almost everything and found no satisfaction with things of the world. In Ecclesiastes, he tells us that he tried wine and women; he built houses, gardens, and parks; he bought slaves, herds and flocks, and amassed silver and gold. "I denied myself nothing my eyes desired; I refused

my heart no pleasure . . . Yet when I surveyed all that my hands had done and what I had toiled to achieve, everything was meaningless, a chasing after the wind; nothing was gained under the sun." (Ecclesiastes 2:10-11). Regarding money, Solomon wrote, "Whoever loves money never has money enough; whoever loves wealth is never satisfied with his income. This too is meaningless" (vs. 5:10).

In closing the book of Ecclesiastes, Solomon wrote, "Now all has been heard; here is the conclusion of the matter: Fear God and keep His commandments, for this the whole duty of man. For God will bring every deed into judgment . . . " (Ecclesiastes 12:13-14). The only thing that finally gave Solomon's life purpose was living for God. Likewise, we as Christians understand that Jesus is the only person who can give us lasting peace, comfort, and security. He alone meets our needs. Jesus' tremendous sacrifice showed us His love for us and His love compels us to love Him and live for Him. Filled with Jesus' presence in our lives, we are empowered to overcome the pull of the world.

What about the Christian account? God works. He creates the universe, then he creates the "crown of his creation", not a "primeval man". And after he created a paradise in the Garden of Eden he gave mankind a simple task. "The LORD God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to work it and take care of it." (Genesis 2:15) In Genesis 1-2 not only do we see the Creator God working, but we also see him giving work to his creation. But notice where it is this work is to take place. It's in the Garden of Eden. Even in paradise work takes place. The Bible is radical in its view of work. It isn't evil, it's a blessing.

The Christian and Work

The culture in which we now live doesn't necessarily view work entirely as an evil. One of the best

representatives of how we view work in America is seen in a quote by famous actor, Kevin Hart. "Everybody wants to be famous, but nobody wants to do the work. I live by that. You grind hard so you can play hard. At the end of the day, you put all the work in, and eventually it'll pay off. It could be in a year, it could be in 30 years. Eventually, your hard work will pay off." What's Kevin Hart's motivation for working? Fame. He puts in deposits of hard work so that later in life he can take out deposits of fame and praise. Even in our current culture, work is not a blessing in and of itself. It's a tool...a means by which we can serve ourselves. It's a job we absolutely must do in order to make a prosperous life for ourselves.

Members in Motion - Sharing Faith in the St Croix High School Dorms

St. Croix Lutheran is unique to most schools in that a fourth of their enrollment (about 100 students) are international students and come from all corners of the world. St. Croix has a new dorm to accommodate housing for all these kids and those that come from the United States. Crown of Life members Chris Maki and Bev Abel are two of six dorm supervisors. Chris's experience comes from years of teaching and coaching while Bev's comes from years of parenting.

Chris Maki began his teaching ministry at St. Andrew's Lutheran School in St. Paul Park

where he taught almost every grade and learned about the challenges and rewards of teaching in a Lutheran school. After several years, Chris started coaching soccer at St. Croix and was offered a position to teach geometry and be a dorm supervisor. Along with this position came new challenges

and rewards, especially as he shares God's Word with students from all over the world.

Both Perry and Bev graduated from St. Croix Lutheran, as well as their children, so the St. Croix ministry is very close to their hearts. After retiring from Travelers, Bev joined the dorm supervising staff in 2015 as the girl's supervisor. She enjoyed being a mom so much, she thought she could take on a dorm full of teenagers. Perry, although not a

dorm supervisor, enjoys engaging with the students and can often be found at their games, concerts or photographing events. He continues to work in real estate and volunteer at Crown of Life.

Living in the dorms can be quite an experience for the students. They come from different cultures, eat different foods, they have to make new friends, and are an ocean away from family. However, no matter where they come from, they are still teenagers. Now, imagine having to







the distance. Nobody's ever gone the distance with Creed, and if I can go that distance... I'm gonna know for the first time in my life, that I weren't just another bum from the neighborhood." Why did Rocky work so hard? To give his life meaning. But what would have happened if Rocky didn't go the distance? What would have happened if Kevin Hart didn't make as an A-list celebrity? Their life would have no meaning. What meaning would life have if Marduk was the creator? What meaning would life have if Pandora's Box was a real thing? Work would be an evi. What would happen if we are all accidents...the product of millions of years of evolution? Life and work would have no value or meaning.

Genesis 1:27, "So God created mankind in his own image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them." A loving God created us in his own image. After he was done, he looked and basically said, "It is finished." And then he rested. Centuries later, God's son cried out from the cross, "It is finished." And then we rested! God worked so hard to credit us with his perfect life and take away our sins so that we could rest. We no longer need to work so that our life has meaning and purpose. We no longer have to work so hard to win approval.


Because we have God's approval we work. Work is not about your meaning and existence. Instead, work is about God. Whatever your job is, it's a way to take care of the Universe God created. It's about caring for the people God made as the crown of his creation. Rest in the eternal rest God has given you.

What makes the dorms successful is there are 6 adults to care for them, discipline, help with homework, bandage their injuries, encourage them, distribute their mail, go to their games, make sure they go to bed on time, and make sure their needs are met. Most supervisors teach which means they have to find time in their day to prepare for the classes, as well. This is called dedication.

What is also unique is St. Croix Middle School has International students who are housed in the dorm. This year there are 7 International and 1 American middle school students living in the dorm. Chris and Bev share in the responsibility of overseeing the Middle Schoolers. or affectionately called "Middles".

To help create a family atmosphere, on Wednesday nights Bev cooks and serves a sitdown, homemade meal in her apartment. This is a time where the dorm "Middles", Chris, Bev and Perry sit down and have a family style meal, talk about the kids' days, and what's going on in their lives. Most Wednesdays, a special guest or two are invited. This has helped the kids with their conversational English, given them a sense of family away from their own, and strengthen the relationships between the kids and the supervisors.

Chris and Bev are very blessed to live and work in an environment where they get to share God's Word. Continue to pray that the Lord bless their work of sharing the gospel with these students.

TREASURER – Fiscal Year July 2016 to June 2017

August ended the fiscal year to date (FYTD) with \$230,205 in total income with expected budget income to be \$356,709 (\$126,503 below budget). Clear the Path matching funds (budgeted) is the main reason for lower than budget income. We hope to balance that by the end of the year. Expenses (FYTD) \$292,518 which gave us a FYTD negative \$62,312. We owe \$0 to our special funds account. Clear the Path contributions (8-31-16) totaled \$607,086 were paid directly to reduce the loan balance to \$810,678. All bills are paid to date. Bob Goff is a seriously good story teller. Bob has done some things in his life that most of us wouldn't even remotely consider. In *Love Does*, Bob recounts many of



the fascinating stories and ridiculous things he has done in his life. At the end of each story he sums up what he learned from that experience and ties in back to God's love for us. Love Does is a reminder that love is not just an emotion or a feeling, but part of the will and results in action. While being relatively weak in the theological department, and sometimes off-base, Love Does still is entertaining and a good reminder to put our love into action. A quick and easy read, I would certainly recommend this New York Times Bestseller.
