I Love You Because...

It's February. That means the stores will be filled with exotic flavors of chocolate in clever packaging. Flowers in varying arrays will be snatched up for that special night. Jewelry sales will spike. Restaurants will have "all hands on deck" as couples will flock to their favorite eateries for a special dinner. Ah yes.....let the Valentines Day festivities begin. It's the one day or even the week where we see so many folks trying to creatively express the same thing: I love you!



But did you ever ask why? Why do you love him? Why does she love you? Perhaps you would consider that a foolish question because it has so many obvious answers. I can still remember sitting in the office of my Associate with my fiancé by my side. We were there to take premarital counseling. He asked me and my beloved the most obvious of questions: "Why do you love her? Why do you love him?"

In my mind I thought it was just a conversation starter. I thought, "I've got this. Easiest question in the world to answer!" I gave some of the typical

answers. "She's beautiful inside and out." She is so giving and kind." I even tossed in a few spiritual compliments, too. "I admire her faith." "She leads me closer to Jesus." My Associate sat and smiled and nodded as he listened.

Then it was my future wife's turn. "Tell me why you love this man...." She gave many flattering answers about how I treated her so well, made her smile and laugh and led her closer to Jesus.

If I asked you the same question (as I often do with those who go through premarital counseling with me even now), would you answer any differently? Be honest. As you look at your sweetheart and think about your relationship, how would you answer the question? I love him/her because..... Is it because of their looks? Their attitude? Their enduring service to you? Do they still make you laugh and smile? Is it their faith that makes you love them?

It has been about 19 years since that day in my Associate's office. I still remember it well. With Mark and Michelle still glowingly proud of their "loving" answers they had just given, he smiled and said, "Those are two of the most self-centered, selfish answers any two people could give. All you have really said is that you love each other because of what the other person can do for you. You love them because

you get something from them that makes you feel good on the inside. At it's core – that's selfishness!" And he was right, of course. Ugh! The model that God points us to is in Ephesians 5. St. Paul said, husbands, love your wives, just as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her... Jesus didn't love us because there was something so loveable about us. He simply chose to love us – no strings attached. And that set the tone for our whole relationship with him! His Heavenly Father's will was to love us, despite all of our sins and failings, and continue to the cross so that we could have a wonderful relationship with him through faith.

Of course, my Associate didn't just dismiss the complimentary things Michelle and I had said about each other as useless. He redefined them as wonderful fruits of faith that we can admire about each other as we serve each other. Jesus loved us first, so we reflect that love to each other. Of course that love will show itself as we serve each other!

I hope you have a wonderful Valentines Day. But I pray that you use Christ's example in how you approach your relationship. Make sure you tell your Valentine, "I love you because I choose to love you, no strings attached – the same way that Jesus loved me. I am determined to show my love for you, just like our Savior did for us. I love you."



ASK THE PASTOR

In Jesus' time, how did one become a Pharisee?

A Paul gives us some insight into that when he was in Jerusalem in Acts 22. He speaks to a hostile crowd and says, "3 "I am a Jew, born in Tarsus of Cilicia, but brought up in this city. Under Gamaliel I was thoroughly trained in the law of our fathers and was just as zealous for God as any of you are today." From Paul's own words we see that to become a Pharisee, just as any other profession, it involved schooling and training.

Q How long did they exist after Jesus' death?

A This is a tricky one to answer. It may be overly simplistic to phrase it this way, but the Pharisees basically became what is now Rabbinic Judaism. One of the most important figures in Rabbinic

Judaism was a man named Johanan ben Zakai, who lived until about 90 AD. Some even consider him the first Rabbi of Judaism, and interestingly he studied under the son of the same Gamaliel mentioned in Acts 22. So, to recap...the title "Pharisee" disappeared in the late 1st century. And although their title disappeared, their teachings basically continued through Rabbinic Judaism.

O Did His death and resurrection change their minds about who he was and how they taught?

A While some Pharisees were apparently converted, i.e. Nicodemus, others hardened their hearts and continued in their false beliefs, and encouraged people to lie about Jesus resurrection, Cf. Matthew 28:11-15.



Do a search on Amazon for books on marriage and you will get somewhere around 21,000 results. So, what sets The Meaning of Marriage apart from all those other books? New York Times best-selling author, Timothy Keller, doesn't have a psychology background, so he doesn't speak from a psychological standpoint. As a pastor, he bases everything he writes on the timeless truths of God's word.



In this book Keller does a couple things very well: 1) With an additional philosophy background he is very good at putting the state of marriage into its proper historical perspective and thus identifying why marriage is in such dire straits in Western Civilization, and 2) he gives us a greater appreciation for the Gospel of our Lord which not only is the source of our ability to love, but also gives us the model to follow in Christ.

This is a great book for both married and unmarried. To quote Keller, this book's "primary goal is to give both married and unmarried people a vision for what marriage is according to the Bible." Being a book that gives such an optimistic view on marriage in a time when marriage is viewed with such pessimism. I would highly recommend this book to both married and unmarried.


5th grade learned about God's strength and power as they studied "The Fall of Jericho." They worked together for a reminder for the rest of the school.

Family Bible Study Ideas

Here is the third and final installment of suggestions for answering the "what should I read or study?" question that we all have occasionally. In October and November there were suggestions for using the Lectionary as a Bible study tool in various ways. This month we'll take a look at a few other possible tools for getting into the Word more regularly.

There are easy-to-follow plans that will guide you through the bible. A simple online search produces a variety of such guides, from reading the entire bible in ninety days (ambitious!) to reading it in one, two, or three years. It can be difficult reading the bible straight through. Many plans switch back and forth between the old and new testaments. Printing out a plan and checking it off as you go provides additional motivation and tracks progress.



Another option for personal devotions is the "Meditations Daily Devotional" which is available to every member in the entrance to the church. This quarterly publication can be

used as a hardcopy or electronically and provides a daily devotion with a

prayer and additional suggestions for bible reading. The booklet also includes a collection of seasonal prayers, special prayers, and a morning and evening prayer for each day of the week. Daily e-devotions are found at http://www.whataboutjesus.com/dailydevotion. This site is a thorough source for personal spiritual growth and encouragement when dealing with any variety of trials, challenges, or questions that arise in life.

Here is a possibility that may apply if your child or grandchild attends a Christian day school, Sunday School, or catechism class - have a discussion about what they are studying and read together any bible references that might be included in their class work. These lessons often have questions or bible verses for the children to consider at home with their family. This offers a great way to engage your child more deeply and to reinforce bible stories and spiritual concepts.

Choose a topic – person, place, or idea - for the week using a concordance. For example, look up the word "peace" and read the context of how it is used. Or maybe read about a person – Gideon, Ruth, or any number of other more or less known people from the

Lastly, here are a couple of suggestions to help apply whatever you may read. Take a moment to ask yourself a few questions, such as: "What does this say about God - who he is...what he's done or will do?" "What does this say about me, others, and our relationships?" "What does this say about the relationship between God and me?" "What does this reading move me to want to do?"

With the New Year Crown of Life is now on the Lectionary Series C on page 165 in the front part of the red hymnals. See October and November's issues for ideas on how to use the Lectionary. Also, don't be shy about asking your pastors questions about the text - your pastors love to clarify and share! So, write down or get a copy of that Lectionary for yourself at home, you might even get yourself a hymnal for at home – it is a rich wealth of prayers, readings, and praises! Give it a try for the next four weeks and see what you think.

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The Force Awakens

The theater darkens, the screen comes to life with a beautiful field of stars, narration crawls across the screen, familiar music swells . . .

The new Star Wars movie is fun for the whole family. *Episode VII – The Force Awakens* takes place about thirty years after 1983's *Return of the Jedi*. The evil Empire, now called the First Order, is still trying to rule the galaxy and is once again facing opposition from the Resistance. Luke Skywalker has been missing for many years and is desperately needed to aid in the rebellion; what follows is the quest to find him.



Those familiar with the Star Wars universe will see many recognizable faces (some truly iconic) and there are a lot of references and callbacks to the original film trilogy, both visual and verbal. However, even if you don't know a Wookie from a womp rat, don't worry – you don't need to be familiar with the previous movies in order to enjoy this chapter.

We have two new protagonists and some new (and pretty creepy) villains, along with a very entertaining little droid. One of the best surprises has to do with the origin story of one of the potential heroes – I won't spoil it, but it's an imaginative touch and a fresh twist on a familiar type of character.

There are epic aerial dogfights, light saber battles, and lot of blaster fire, all of which account for the film's PG-13 rating. There is also a lot of humor, wonderful scenery, some very poignant moments, and of course the traditional interesting alien creatures. It's two hours and 16 minutes of pure entertainment.
