Freedom seems like such a simple concept. No restrictions. That's the essence of freedom. It seems simple. Yet, there are so many complications that come with it. 240 years ago the Colonists decided they were willing to give up their lives in order to fight for freedom. And many did give their lives. Less than 100 years later the Union went to war with the Confederate states. This was another war motivated by the pursuit of freedom. More recently, the United States captured and arrested the President of Iraq, Saddam Hussein, for his crimes against humanity. Humanitarian concern motivated another fight for freedom.

What do all these wars have in common? They were all fought in the name of freedom. And yet, there is a complication that came with them all. Ironically, freedom had to be restricted in order to obtain that freedom.

Freedom is complicated. The fight for freedom is a giving up of freedom. The soldiers who fight for our country give up the freedom of living in their own homes, eating with their own families, sleeping in their own beds. They give that up in order to ensure that others can enjoy those freedoms. That's how freedom works. In order to enjoy the bliss of freedom, one has to curb

Freedom Complications continued

or restrict other freedoms. Here's an example of what that means: When I was a young boy growing up, I had a desire to be a great baseball pitcher. But in order to enjoy the feeling of being a good pitcher I had to practice. And that's what I did. I practiced pitching from a mound for many years. I would run to stay in shape. I would lift weights and stretch regularly. Hours and hours were put into training. Hours I could have freely used doing a number of other things. I could have spent those hours with family or friends, on improving at a different sport, or even on increasing my intellectual acumen. But I didn't. I restricted my freedom to do all those other things in order to enjoy the deeper freedom of being a good baseball pitcher. Freedom is complicated like that. In order to enjoy certain freedoms other freedoms have to be restricted.

Let's consider a case study of what freedom looks like concerning the topic of love. We live in an age when people are so quick to say, "I should be free to love whatever and whomever I want." But the freedom of love is one where the restrictions of freedoms are most prevalent. There's a story of a young newlywed man who was on his way home from work. He took a small detour without notifying his wife he would be a little late. When he got home his wife didn't hug and kiss him. Her normal greeting of, "Hey, honey! How was work?" was replaced by, "Where were you?" At this very moment the newlywed man realized that his freedom to make even the smallest unilateral decision was gone forever. In order to enjoy the deeper freedom of the love marriage offers, people will restrict other freedoms. Freedoms like making small unilateral decisions.

There's maybe one more complication that comes from freedom. That complication is illustrated well in an editorial from the New York Times. The author was a very successful young man who had achieved so much, and yet was left with a lingering emptiness no amount of success could fill. Here's what the author writes,

"In the aftermath of the civil rights movement, women's liberation, the movement from the cities to the suburbs, the birth of rock-and-roll and other changes, basic laws of social gravity had lost their pull. We were free to be white or black, gay or straight, to grow our hair long, shave our heads, meditate for days on end, have children or not, drink bottled water, work out at the gym, watch television until 3 in the morning and otherwise exist outside the traditional roles and the close, gossipy communities that had burdened and constrained our parents growing up in Brooklyn or the Bronx.


This freedom from the gravity of age-old constraints was accompanied by a weightless feeling that attached itself to even the most fundamental human decisions. Why bother? Why get married? What are families for? What was new about these questions was that they didn't have answers, or that the answers they did have were so multiple and contingent and arbitrary that they never really felt like answers at all."

David Samuels, the author, is capturing a very relevant point about freedom. When there is freedom to do anything, freedom to be anything, then there is no purpose. There is no drive or focus. That's another complication that comes from freedom. With absolute freedom comes no meaning, focus, or purpose for life.

It's pretty clear...Absolute freedom comes with complications. However, there is one exception. "Therefore, there is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus, because through Christ Jesus the law of the Spirit who gives life has set you free from the law of sin and death," (Romans 8:1-2). The Apostle Paul explains that there are no complications when it comes to the freedom we have in Jesus. When Jesus paid for all our sins, he says there is no exception to this freedom. Because of his perfect life and death, there is no hell for you. Sin is swallowed up. Death defeated.

There is no complications to our eternal spiritual freedom. But let me quickly apply how in love we still restrict our freedoms. Jesus said in John 14:15, "If you love me, keep my commands." Even though keeping those commands of Jesus doesn't give us ultimate spiritual freedom, because Jesus already gave it to us, in love we still obey them. We restrict our freedoms to show our love to the Lord. So maybe a thought jumps into my head, "I've got other things I want to do this weekend instead of going to church." And even though I know Jesus obeyed the 3rd commandment perfectly for me, so I am completely free to not go to church, I will still restrict that freedom. In love, I will listen to my Lord and worship him.

Freedom is complicated at times, isn't it? But the freedom Jesus gives us from sin, death and the devil isn't. It's guaranteed and certain. No exceptions. Continue to pray to the Lord for strength as you consider how you use that freedom, and restrict it at times, to show your love to the Lord.



A New Breed of Mission Work

I'd like to introduce you to Costa Maya Ministries. The Mission is located in the town of Mahahual on the Mexican Caribbean in the far eastern part of Mexico near the Belizean boarder. The work being done in the Costa Maya represents a new breed of World Missions. Associated, but not supported by or an official part of the World Missions within the WELS, the effort was

started almost 7 years ago by the initial efforts of Lynn and Jerry Zimpelmann, a couple from Northern Wisconsin who had recently built a beach front home in the area.

The Costa Maya (Mayan Coast) is part of an exciting new frontier in the Yucatan Peninsula that started in the Cancun area 40 years ago and has expanded southward year by year. Originally inhabited by a few native Mayans who mostly lived off fishing and coconut farming, the area is quickly becoming a mecca for vacationing and recreational beach front living, attracting people from all over the world.

The Zimpelmanns were part of that boom. They completed their home in June of 2008. That August the coast was visited by Dean, one of only two Category 5 Hurricanes to ever make landfall.

A nearly 30 foot wave crested over their home doing massive damage to their as-yet-unoccupied home and devastating the entire area. Many people lost everything, their homes and all their property. Deb and Hugh

Blackburn, a South Carolina couple who had moved down there were two such people. The Zimpelmanns took them in. They stayed on and became trusted friends and caretakers. Deb also became a believer. In Jesus Christ.

Deb was hungry for the Gospel and wanted to have a permanent place to worship. Lynn and Jerry were spending more time down there and felt the same need.

Jerry thought this might be a great area to begin a mission field and spoke to the Synod about the possibility of getting something started. Although very interested, the Synod was not very encouraging about the prospects.

The Zimplmann's son-in-law Brad Krause was up for a call assignment having just completed a two year stint as a tutor at Nebraska Lutheran High school. Jerry asked if Brad might be able to take a one year hiatus before taking a permanent call. The idea was for Brad and his new wife Heidi Zimpelmann to spend a year "planting seeds" and prospecting to assess the viability of the area for a world mission site. Brad and Heidi would live in the Zimpelmann's home and be self-sustained along with the help of a few interested supporters. When the year was up,

Jerry went back to the Synod's World Board with a very exciting report. The Gospel was being proclaimed in two areas. 20 to 30 people were worshiping! There was little doubt the area had great potential. Sadly the Synod had no resources to take on the new effort.

That was nearly 7 years and 5 temporary missionaries ago. The Synod has never been able to help financially, but they have helped support in many other ways. Last November Costa Maya Missions called Pastor Martin Valleskey to be their 1st fulltime missionary. Today, with the help of an ever growing number of supporting partners including a dedicated board of directors, the mission is thriving. In any given week as many as 80 people are hearing and studying God's Word in the


two preaching stations. On Saturday's 20 or more children and young people learn about their Savior and how they can tell others. An adult Bible study meets on the beach on Fridays just before the weekly soup kitchen that provides food and fellowship for the many poor and hungry. An old 15 passenger van was purchased last year that helps gather and deliver those who live in remote areas and have

couple that runs a local dive shop came to Pastor. They have three children going to the local school and are very concerned about the prospects for a good future in the minimal school system there. They wanted to know if we could help. Pastor told them about our strong commitment to private Christian based education. They got excited. There are many people coming in from surrounding communities to work the tourist industry. They are interested in having worship in their towns as well.

There are also many opportunities to get involved as volunteers. Groups are coming in from Lutheran High Schools and colleges as well as an increasing number of individuals to help canvass, teach English as a second language, help with community projects and just be an encouragement. Costa Maya is a true tropical paradise and is probably the safest place in Mexico today — as safe or safer than any town in America.



At this point, their efforts represent just a fraction of the financial needs at CMM, but their commitment is strong and growing. They have sent volunteers of their own down each of the first two years with much more planned in the future. If just two or three congregations could duplicate that type of support CMM would be well on its way to long term permanent

sustainability. One can only wonder what further opportunities the LORD might provide in Costa Maya for the spread of His precious Gospel.

Cultural Exchange Trip to Germany

Guten Tag! For two weeks in June, 15 students from St. Croix and 6 from Minnesota Valley Lutheran in New Ulm traveled with chaperones Mrs. Jean Neitzel and Pastor Dave Huebner to Siegen, Germany. Siegen is a

city of about 100,000 located in Nordrhein-Westfalen, between Frankfurt and Cologne.

For over ten years now the Evangelisches Gymnasium (secondary school) of Siegen has partnered with St. Croix and other "Area Lutheran High Schools" in an exchange program. In odd-numbered years the students from Siegen come to America during their 2-week Easter break, and in even-numbered years students from our school travel to Germany in June to stay with a host family while their school is still in session.

Highlights of the trip, besides getting to know a family personally, included going to a Hochseilgarten, or high-ropes challenge course. The three experienced trainers did some interesting team-building and trust-building games in the morning. Then in the afternoon the students, both Germans and Americans, challenged themselves to climb various 'high-ropes' obstacles and slid down a zipline.

Another highlight was a trip to the large, historical city of Cologne. Immediately outside of the Hauptbahnhof, or main train station, our students had their first look at the incredible "Koelner Dom," a cathedral that took

hundreds of years to complete. Climbing the 510 steps to the top of one of the twin spires is a breath-taking adventure, in more ways than one! In Cologne students also toured the Chocolate Museum, and some came home with more than a few pounds of treats for family members.

A 'public-viewing' of the German national soccer team who were playing in the European Cup was a memory not soon forgotten.

At the end of our stay in Siegen there were many tears as our students left their host 'brothers and sisters' behind. Our group then took the train to Ruedesheim, a quaint tourist city on the beautiful Rhein River. A boat trip to Castle Rheinstein and a group supper, along with hiking up to the nearby Niederwalddenkmal (lower woods monument), were lasting memories for the group before our

TREASURER – Fiscal Year 7/1 to 6/16

May ended the fiscal year to date (FYTD) with \$1,457,160 in total income with expected budget income to be \$1,448,288 (\$8,871 above budget). Expenses (FYTD) were \$1,393,108 which gave us a FYTD of a positive \$64,051. We paid back \$16,621 so owe \$0 to our special funds account.
