Dedication to Doctrine

"If you hold to my teaching, you are really my disciples. Then you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free." (John 8:31)

The Negative View of Doctrine

Over the past few hundred years there has been an ever growing emphasis in Christian churches to get away from doctrine. It's almost as if the very word "doctrine" is taboo. It's something that has taken root in people's hearts. I've heard multiple people say something similar to this many times before: "We don't need more doctrine. We need more love. I don't need to know the teachings of the Bible to show my love."

This point of view is still very prevalent in churches and in the hearts of millions of individuals. In both "liberal" and "conservative" churches, there is a resistance to an emphasis on doctrine. Often it is put this way: "We are not saved by believing doctrines and teachings, but by obedient trust in God. What matters is acting in loving Christ-like way."

Doctrine Directs All

This is a very simplistic way of viewing things. Echoing C.S. Lewis, this is "the view I call Christianity-and-water, the view which simply says there is a good God in Heaven and everything is all right - leaving out all the difficult and terrible doctrines about sin and hell and the devil, and the redemption...these are boys' philosophies."

Dedication to Doctrine... continued

David Martyn Lloyd Jones had an even harsher sentiment for this kind of "boys' philosophy". "Whether you like it or not, to speak like that is, in and of itself, to speak in a doctrinal manner. To make statements along that line is, in actual practice, to commit yourself to a particular doctrine... the doctrine of works and, in a sense, of justification by works.' 'Ah, but' they reply, 'we are not interested in such a term as 'justification by works.'" But whether they are interested in such terminology of not, that is exactly what they are saying... In other words, whether we like it or not, we cannot avoid doctrine. ... There is no such thing as an irreligious person; everyone has his or her religion, if you mean by religion that ultimate philosophy or view of life by which people live."

In short, Lloyd Jones is saying we all have a doctrine by which we live. So many live by the "deeds not creeds" religion. When someone says, "I don't care about doctrine, it's how you live that matters," that person is promoting a doctrine. It's doctrine of justification by works. That person has a doctrine they are promoting that is very important. When a person follows this doctrine it leads to a life of trying to earn God's favor by living a good life.

So what's the point? Your doctrine, or what you believe, always leads to a way of life. When you have the wrong doctrine, you also have the wrong way of life. Doctrine is important.

When We Misuse Doctrine

As important as doctrine is, there is a danger that comes with this understanding. The danger that comes with this is when people see their only mission in life as protecting pure doctrine. How can you tell if this happens? Lloyd Jones says it this way: they have "lost their tempers, forgetting that by so doing they were denying the very doctrine which they claimed to believe".

Doctrine should never be the end, but rather the means. The Bible says it this way, "For I am not ashamed of the gospel, because it is the power of God that brings salvation to everyone who believes." (Romans 1:16) In other words, the doctrine of the Bible is the very word of God and it is the tool God uses to save people. Saving people! That's the mission and the tool we use is the pure doctrine and teaching of the Bible.

What are the applications of this? Many. But let me expound on just a few.

- 1. Paul writes, "Instead, speaking the truth in love, we will grow to become in every respect the mature body of him who is the head, that is, Christ. (Eph 4:15) If we only speak the truth of doctrine, we forget love. If we preach only loving things like, "As long as you're a good person you'll be saved," we forget the truth. Balance is necessary.
- 2. If you only dedicate yourself to being good for the sake of earning God's favor, you'll lose yourself. But if you dedicate yourself to the truth of God and his word, to pure doctrine, you'll find the balance of truth and love.
- 3. Finally, nothing could be more worthy than dedicating yourself to the word of God. When you do so you see the truth that you and I are far more horribly sinful than we could have possibly realized, and yet far more deeply loved than we could possibly imagine. That's the heart of the gospel truth.

Conclusion

As a pastor, i sometimes get the feeling that we tend to lose our dedication to God during the summer months, myself included. It seems like the business of family and work takes a priority. Whether that's true or not, let me encourage you to dedicate yourself to the pure word of God. When you do it pays off dividends beyond measure. It leads to an overwhelming feeling of love that flows from the realization that God loves you beyond what you can imagine. And that feeling then turns into a life of love towards others. Doctrine does indeed affect our lives. Dedicate yourself to the pure doctrine of God's undeserved love for you as the only way to salvation.

REPORTS

TREASURER Fiscal Year 7/17 - 6/18

May ended the fiscal year to date (FYTD) with \$1,566,338 in total income with expected budget income to be \$1,510,734 which was \$55,604 above budget. (58,956 is an undesignated bequest and \$21,000 are special donations for the Pre-K playground.) Expenses (FYTD) were \$1,509,047 which gave us a FYTD of +\$57,290. (FYTD) Envelope Offerings are \$82,427 less than budgeted. We owe \$20,000 to our special funds account and current available balance is \$95,002.

ASK THE PASTOR

How do we know Moses was accurate in recording the events of creation?

One of Satan's tools for undermining God's word is calling into question the authenticity and accuracy of the first five books of the Bible. So how do we respond to this attack? In short, there are two main points I would make. First, for over 3000 years this has been widely accepted by all people. It hasn't been in questions that Moses was the writer of the first five books of the Bible. There are plenty of Bible passages that confirm Moses did indeed write the first five books of the Bible, which would include the creation account.

- 1. Moses claims he wrote these books: Exodus 17:14; 24:4; 34:27; Numbers 33:1–2; Deuteronomy 31:9–11.
- 2. We also have the witness of the rest of the Old Testament: Joshua 1:8; 8:31–32; 1 Kings 2:3; 2 Kings 14:6; 21:8; Ezra 6:18; Nehemiah 13:1; Daniel 9:11–13; Malachi 4:4.
- 3. The New Testament is also clear in its testimony: Matthew 19:8; John 5:45–47; 7:19; Acts 3:22; Romans 10:5; Mark 12:26.

And secondly, if someone is going to claim Moses didn't write these books and they are, therefore, not authoritative, then they must come up with an alternate suggestion for an author. Every other suggestion that has been proposed over the past couple hundred years fails to hold water.

STEWARDSHIP THOUGHT

Giving a Cup of Cold Water

During Jesus' last three years on earth, He spent much time nourishing and teaching His disciples. Only when they were prepared to go out into the world to preach, teach, and heal did He send them. Leaving without provisions, the disciples were totally dependent upon those whom the Lord would send them for their support. The disciples relied upon the power of the Gospel to move the hearts of their listeners who would willingly provide for their needs. They were to travel light and trust in the Lord.

And if anyone gives even a cup of cold water to one of these little ones because he is My disciple, I tell you the truth, he will certainly not lose his reward." of the 12 original disciples, we assist the spreading of the Gospel by supporting today's disciples and missionaries around the world. As we provide for church workers locally and abroad in the name of Jesus, we are serving the Lord Himself.

As we express our Christian faith through our giving and serving, God is pleased. God notices every act of compassion and kindness that we express. In the verse above, He refers to even the simple gesture of giving a cup of cold water to a thirsty person. Through our faith, we are empowered to do acts of service. When we act in response to the Lord and not for recognition, God will bless us. Having already been assured of salvation by God's grace through faith, blessings such as peace, contentment, patience, and hope are added rewards.

Only a small number of people make their living as fulltime church workers, but we all are given the privilege and opportunity to be Christ's ambassadors. May God bless us all as we work to further His kingdom.


TIMOTHY KELLER | RELIGIOUS | ★ ★ ★ ★
