What Does Christmas Do for You?

The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of deep darkness a light has dawned. (Isaiah 9:2)

The Festival of Lights is a beautiful and highly symbolic celebration. But, which religion am I talking about when I refer to this festival? Interestingly, many religions celebrate the festival of lights in one way or another. Hindi, Jews, and Christians alike celebrate it. Why? What does it represent? Light is a symbol. It can symbolize many different things, but in each of these religions it contains a similar idea...the triumph of good over evil.

Isn't it interesting that each of us has an idea of right and wrong? What's more, we all know something is terribly wrong with this world. We know there is wickedness, evil, and wrongdoing in this world. And our collective hearts ache for everything "dark" to be removed from this world. That's what all these religions are celebrating with the festival of lights...the triumph of good over evil. So how does that happen?

The world has its ideas on how we will eventually destroy everything wicked and dark in this world. So did the people of Israel. In Isaiah 8 the Lord tells us what the Israelites were going to do when they faced troubles, hardships, and darkness.

Distressed and hungry, they will roam through the land... Then they will look toward the earth and see only distress and darkness and fearful gloom, and they will be thrust into utter darkness. (Isaiah 8:21-22)

What do we see them doing for a solution? They are turning to this world and the things of this world to solve their problems and the darkness they face in their lives. What is the result? What do they find? How does the world help them conquer the darkness? They "see only distress and darkness and fearful gloom." And to make matters worse, "they will be thrust into utter darkness." Looking to the world to solve the problems of the world clearly doesn't work. In fact, it only makes the darkness darker. That was the Israelites' solution, and it didn't work.

What do we look to? Do we look to anything better to solve the darkness in our lives? One of the problems we see in this world is poverty. That's a darkness that's been around as long as there has been sin in the world. And what are the solutions?

Well, we often look to political solutions. The problem with this is that it seems like looking to politicians and a ruling body to solve the problem of poverty has only caused division and more darkness. Is the best way to help poor people to shrink government and let the private capital markets allocate resources, or is it to expand the government and give the state predominance? Finding in the Bible a clear mandate for complete capitalism or for communism is an impossible task.

And though the Bible isn't clear and doesn't give express commands on the best political way to care for the poor, there are people who still believe one way or the other is the gospel truth. The result of this is division, anger, hatred from one side to the other. When people look to politics to be the solution to the darkness of this world, it only makes the darkness worse.

Sickness and disease is another terror that darkens the world. And to what earthly solution do we turn to rid us of this darkness? Don't we turn to technological and medical advances to bring some brightness to these forms of darkness?

Maybe they have helped with advances in medicine? But haven't we also created super viruses? Haven't the advances in technology also lead to nuclear bombs? Technological advances have lead to the stealing of hundreds of millions of personal identities and data. Overall, technology, while it can be a good thing, often becomes a tool for darkness.

And when all these dark problems of the world come crashing down on the brightness of our lives, where do we turn? Often, we turn to people. Relationships are blessings. There's no arguing the amazing benefits and blessings of having people who love you in your life. However, people fail. People are the ones who steal identities, not technology. People are the ones who run corrupt governments and are more interested in putting money in their own pockets rather than helping people who truly need it.

Doesn't it seem a little foolish to think people are the solution to the darkness of this world, when people bring darkness into it? What's the solution to the darkness in this world?

It's the same solution God gave to the Israelites when they were experiencing extremely dark times. "For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace." (Isaiah 9:6)

To bring light to a sin darkened world, light had to come into this world. And it had to come from outside of this world. That's exactly who Jesus is and what he did. He is the eternal mighty God. Though he was rich, for our sake he became poor and took on the likeness of a child.

That's what Christmas is all about. God coming to solve the darkness of this world. And that's what Jesus did. Instead of letting us all suffer and die in our misery, he suffered and died in our place. And that means there is hope! There is hope that one day poverty will no longer exist. There is hope that diseases and death will one day be defeated. There is hope that our most perfect relationships will be eclipsed by an absolutely perfect relationship with our loving God in heaven.

Until that day comes, continue to find your hope and place all your hope in Jesus alone. Finding absolute hope and comfort in him you can then be the light this world needs. Care for those who need it, and look for ways to build relationships, not tear them down. In doing so, you can give this world a glimpse of the light there is in Jesus.

Who Are We, Anyway?

Scripture Reading: "But we have this treasure in jars of clay to show that this all-surpassing power is from God and not from us" (2 Corinthians 4:7).

At this time of year, our minds are drawn to thoughts of our Savior, as they should be. The ages-old story is always fresh and exciting to us as Christians as we rejoice in our Father's great love for us shown in His sending His own Son for us. That Son came in the form of a Baby who was nurtured inside His mother's body, a "treasure in a jar of clay."

The angels announced His birth; the shepherds left their sheep and came to worship Him; the Wise Men traveled many miles to adore Him and bring Him their gifts. "But Mary treasured up all these things and pondered them in her heart" (Luke 2:19). She still had "this treasure in a jar of clay."

Total Fair Sales: \$4,115.43


We were able to take 50% of sales and turn that into Scholastic Dollars, also earning an additional 5% by taking all of the proceeds in books.


Total Scholastic Dollars Reward Earned: \$2,263.48

In life science we dissected earthworms, crayfish, frogs, sea stars, and will soon examine owl pellets.

We sent cards and letters to veterans (we knew about...) for Veteran's Day.

Our class sponsors a COL school food drive from Thanksgiving - Christmas. Last year we collected 675 lbs. We hope to match or exceed that total this year.

Clearly, the highlight of the year so far, was the 3 day, 2 night stay at **Eagle Bluff Environmental Learning Center** in Lanesboro, MN. God blessed us with fantastic weather as students and chaperones participated in classes such as: Birds, Winter Survival, and Oneota (ancient Native American

> tribe). There were naturalist programs on the timber rattler and raptor physics, starring a hungry red-tailed hawk. We had great fun at the campfire, outdoor games, and, everyone who started it finished the "Treetops" high ropes course. COL students also achieved awards for conservation and the "Food-Wise" program (reaching the goal of having less than 1 lb. 8 oz. of food waste for our group's 7 meals at Eagle Bluff).


The Other Wes Moore

The chilling truth is that his story could have been mine. The tragedy is that my story could have been his.

Two kids named Wes Moore were born blocks apart within a year of each other. Both grew up fatherless in similar Baltimore neighborhoods and had difficult childhoods; both hung out on street corners with their crews; both ran into trouble with the police. How, then, did one grow up to be a Rhodes Scholar, decorated veteran, White House Fellow, and business leader, while the other ended up a convicted murderer serving a life sentence? Wes Moore, the author of this book, sets out to answer this question with alternating narratives that take readers from heart-wrenching losses to moments of surprising redemption.



The Other Wes Moore shows there are no easy explanations. Moore the author makes no attempt to justify the imprisoned Moore's actions, even while detailing a familiar litany of neglect, absence of male role models and bad choices. The successful Wes Moore also shows he was far from perfect in his youth, but thanks to his loving family's insistence that he fulfill his potential, he excelled in academics and forged a satisfying career. Through hundreds of interviews, not only with his namesake, but with police, social workers and others, Moore's book reaffirms the impact that even one tough parent can have on a child's ultimate success or failure.
