I was about 7 years old. My brother, 5 years older than me, and I often went to a park not far from our house to ride our bikes. It had long dirt paths, the kind of paths which would make every parent nervous for their 7 year old to bike on. One of the bike jumps was nicknamed "Nightmare". The path took a bike rider down a 12 foot incline and then shot them up a 3 foot shoot, hurling them about 4 feet in the air. There was NO WAY I was going to go down it. But my brother and all his friends did. They had the courage, I didn't...at least until I saw my brother go first. That's what it takes to be a leader, courage.

Courage of Joshua


When I think of courage, I think of Joshua. When Moses died after he lead the Israelites for about 40 years, Joshua took over. God said this to Joshua, "Moses my servant is dead. Now then, you and all these people, get ready to cross the Jordan River into the land." (Joshua 1:2) What land was he to cross into and lead the Israelites? The land of Canaan. A land described by the Israelites who explored it like this, "The land we explored devours those living in it. All the people we saw there are of great size. We saw the Nephilim there (the descendants of Anak come from the Nephilim). We seemed like grasshoppers in our own eyes, and we looked the same to them." (Numbers 13:32-33)

It seems daunting, doesn't it? Being a newly established leader and tasked with defeating numerous very powerful nations with an untrained group of recently freed slaves doesn't seem like an enviable job. How was Joshua going to proceed?



Overplanning Can Kill

When you think of great military strategists people like Napoleon, Alexander the Great, and Admiral Lord Nelson come to mind. Joshua could have sat himself down and started planning. He could have tried to come up with the perfect strategy, the foolproof plan to defeat the Canaanites. He could have waited until he had the unbeatable military plan on paper before he acted.

The problem with that plan is we often miss out on opportunities because we drag our feet. I think back to when I was 7, I was on top of that hill on my bike, planning my path down, trying to make sure I knew exactly what the jump was going to be like, meticulously plotting every move and motion. I missed out on being the leader as six or seven of my brother's friends blew past me and went down ahead of me.

There have been countless missed opportunities in history for this very reason. In 2000, Netflix approached Blockbuster about buying out their newly formed company. Presently Blockbuster now has one store remaining, and I am guessing the owners of Blockbuster are kicking themselves as Netflix is valued at around \$160 Billion. Waiting until the plan is perfect often causes paralysis. You miss out on amazing opportunities.

Plan and Trust

So what's the point? Do we just courageously jump right in to every endeavor we come across? Does God have anything to say about that? Of course! "Now it is required that those who have been given a trust must prove faithful" (1 Corinthians 4:2). God gives different abilities and tasks to each of us, and he asks us to do our best. Joshua had been given the task of defeating an entire region of enemies. How did he prove faithful to that task? He first

planned. He sent spies into the the land to discover what their best strategy might be (Joshua 2). He gave all credit to the Lord (Joshua 3:10). He prayed to God when there were hardships and troubles (Joshua 7:7ff.). Finally, he put all his trust in the promises of the Lord, "As I was with Moses, so I will be with you; I will never leave you nor forsake you. Be strong and courageous, because you will lead these people to inherit the land I swore to their ancestors to give them" (Joshua 1:5–6).

Joshua found a way to balance being a faithful manager of the trust God had given him with trusting in God. He made plans and a military strategy. He executed his plans. And as he executed his plans he trusted not in his plans, but in the sure promises and strength of the Lord Almighty.

Courageous Leadership in Action

Knowing God's promises we really shouldn't be afraid to be leaders, right? We still are. Why is that? Isn't it because, as leaders, we are in a position of public scrutiny? Leaders are often visible and their plans are seen by many and possibly even scrutinized by many. Don't you think a few Israelites, at the very least, scratched their heads when they were told to simply march around Jericho and its walls would crash down? What an odd plan from this new leader Joshua! Leaders will be scrutinized. It's a fact. You will be scrutinized for being a Christian. It's a fact. But we still lead. Why? Because we are focused more on the way things could be, than on what people want or what they might say.

Friends in Christ, what are some "could be's" in your home? What are some ways you could make your home more Godly, your family, your church, your self? Put plans together. Pray to God about them. Trust his promises, "I will never leave you nor forsake you." Forget about human scrutiny. And finally, act. Be bold and courageous leaders.

STEWARDSHIP THOUGHT

What Enables Sacrificial Giving?

Scripture Reading: "Out of the most severe trial, their overflowing joy and their extreme poverty welled up in rich generosity. For I testify that they gave as much as they were able, and even beyond their ability. Entirely on their own, they urgently pleaded with us for the privilege of sharing in this service to the saints" (2 Corinthians 8:2-4).

The "they" in the passage above refers to the Macedonian churches whom Paul commends for their generous, sacrificial giving. How could they do it? Obviously, things weren't too rosy for them, since Paul speaks of their "severe trial." Was it that, although they had trials, they still had plenty of money? No, for Paul writes that they gave out of their "extreme poverty." Were they prodded and made to feel guilty? Were they pressured to give until they just handed it over? No, again. They gave "entirely on their own." They were the ones who were doing the pleading, begging for the opportunity to share what they had with others.

Can you imagine believers in your congregation urgently pleading for the privilege of giving? Not really, so again we ask, "What enables sacrificial giving?" Their motivation seems to be "their overflowing joy." If someone saved your life or the life on one you dearly loved, wouldn't you be filled with "overflowing joy"? Wouldn't you want to give something to that person in gratitude? Wouldn't you give all you had to save your life or the live of a loved one? Wouldn't you gladly go into debt to save a life?

Perhaps that's what the Macedonians recognized. Their lives and the lives of their loved ones had been saved by Another, namely Jesus, Who, by His death and resurrection, brings us all out of death into life. Pondering this, they gladly gave all they had and more so that others could receive the same blessing. They gave to those in need, because they had received. They were enabled by Christ's love to give sacrificially. They couldn't NOT give!

Discussion Thoughts:

- 1. Read 2 Corinthians 8:1-7. What was the first priority for the Macedonians? How was that also a motivation to give?
- 2. What kind of giver are you? One who gives less than you can? A proportionate giver? A generous giver? A sacrificial giver?
- 3. What would enable you to move up a level in your giving?

Prayer:

Dear Heavenly Father, I confess that I am lukewarm. Lord, I pray that You would warm my cold heart lest You spit me out of Your mouth (Revelation 3:16)! I know that I take for granted this life of grace that You have made possible to me at great cost. I pray that You would "restore to me the joy of Your salvation" (Psalm 51:12). Help me to respond to Your grace by giving myself to You through service in acts of love and gifts of money that others may come to know Your Son Who has brought us from death into life. In His name I pray. Amen.


