Organic Growth in the New Year

It's time for another new year. What are your goals? In what ways do you hope and plan to grow as a person? As a Christian? The Bible has a lot to say about spiritual growth, and what it says is often counterintuitive to the way we think of growing.

Mechanical Growth

How do you grow the size of your house? You add onto it mechanically. You add more framing, more bricks, more insulation, more everything. It takes hard work and dedication to add onto it. Mechanical growth is exactly what it sounds like...it's mechanical. It's a process. It's one step after another. Even right now as I look out my office window, I am imagining the mechanical work involved in making the snow on the sidewalk go away, and all the while, making the pile of shoveled snow grow larger. Step one: grab a shovel. Step two: move the snow. Step three: pile the snow off the sidewalk. Step by step the snow pile grows.

As a pastor, I have had people ask me before, "How do you know your faith is strong?" Or, "How do I grow my faith?" Human instinct goes to mechanical growth. We think we can make our faith grow the same way we make a pile of snow grow... mechanically, step by step. "My faith will grow by reading the Bible, confessing my sins, going to church, making amends for the wrong things I've done." That's the way the thinking goes. But there's a danger in thinking that way. It makes my faith and my salvation dependant upon me! And that's a dangerous line of thought. When salvation is dependant upon me, that opens the door for lots of doubt. So how does our faith grow?

Organic Growth

The Bible speaks about spiritual growth not in a mechanical way, but in an organic way. Jesus tells many parables about faith being like a seed. Just consider one from Mark 4:26-28,

"This is what the kingdom of God is like. A man scatters seed on the ground. Night and day, whether he sleeps or gets up, the seed sprouts and grows, though he does not know how. All by itself the soil produces grain — first the stalk, then the head, then the full kernel in the

head." Notice that Jesus is comparing faith to that of a seed. It doesn't grow by some mechanism on the outside working into it. It grows from the inside out. It grows organically. That's how a plant grows, and that's how faith grows.

Here's the main point...we can't do anything to ourselves to make our faith grow. As much as we would like it, there isn't a step 1, step 2, step 3 to making our faith grow. There are plenty of places in the Bible where God makes this clear. Just take for example Romans 5:5, "God has poured out his love into our hearts by

the Holy Spirit, whom he has given us." Notice that it doesn't say that we can put love into our hearts through a step by step mechanical process. The only way for God's love to come into our hearts is by the Holy Spirit given to us by God. Spiritual growth in faith isn't something we can get for ourselves. It's not a growth we can mechanically develop. It has to be organic.

Planted in Our Hearts

So how does the Holy Spirit come into our hearts? This goes back to God's word. Romans 10:17 says, "...faith comes from hearing the message, and the message is heard through the word of Christ." The Holy Spirit is the one who grows faith in

our hearts, but the Holy Spirit always uses a tool, his word. And he specifically uses the message of Christ. The only way for our faith to grow is for it to grow organically, from the inside out. Should it be a surprise, then, that Jesus came from the outside into our world and lives? Jesus lived outside this world as the creator of the universe. But when he saw this world devastated by sin, he intervened. He came into this world and died for this world. He saved it from the inside out by coming

into this world, taking the sin of the world, and laying down his life for the world. That's what the Holy Spirit does for each of us when we come to faith. He comes into our heart and grows our faith organically from the inside out.

Conclusion

If you have a desire for you faith to grow this year, don't look to yourself. Don't think it depends on you and what you do.

I recently listened to a podcast about setting goals. The speaker encouraged listeners to not set goals. Instead, he encouraged listeners to develop habits. I would encourage the same thing. Don't set a goal to read or study so

much of God's word. Instead, develop a habit of connecting to God through his word. Develop a habit of spending time with God the Holy Spirit in his word.

The other habit I would encourage is the habit of repentance. Martin Luther wrote this as the first of the 95 Theses. "When our Lord and Master Jesus Christ said, "Repent" (Matthew 4:17), he willed the entire life of believers to be one of repentance." Every time you repent, you have to turn to God and his word for comfort. You have to turn to God alone for forgiveness. And with that comes growth in the Spirit. As you stay connected to God's word this year, may the Holy Spirit continue to grow in you.

Engaging God's World






In 1643, the founders of Harvard College wrote out their mission statement: "Let every Student be plainly instructed, and earnestly pressed, to consider well the maine end of his life and studies is to know God and Jesus Christ which is eternal life, Jn. 17:3, and therefore to lay Christ, in the bottom, as the only foundation of all sound knowledge and Learning."

Today Harvard operates far from their mission statement as does a majority of our culture while still claiming to be Christian. In Engaging God's World, Cornelius Plantiga Jr. recounts God's plan for the world. But he does so with the purpose of encouraging the reader to think about how the Christian worldview should affect his/her life.

I found this book to be compelling enough to set it down several times just to ponder my own engagement with the world in which we live. Reading Plantinga isn't the fastest, but it is extremely thought provoking and engaging.





READ THE WHOLE BIBLE IN 2 YEARS

This two-year plan will take you through the entire Bible in two years, reading Matthew, Mark and Romans twice. The Bible's Wisdom Literature will be spread out over the Saturdays. Readings range from one to four chapters each day balancing between Old and New Testaments. 620 reading days = 1200 chapters (870 Old, 330 New).

Setting Goals - A Stewardship Thought

The new year brings with it new resolve, but so often that resolve fades before the first week is ended. The apostle Paul advised the Corinthians, "Last year you were the first not only to give but also to have the desire to do so. Now finish the work, so that your eager willingness to do it may be matched by your completion of it, according to your means" (2 Corinthians 8:10, 11). By ourselves, we grow tired or get bored or just plain lazy. Let us ask the Lord to give us the desire to give generously, to serve joyfully, and to expend our time eagerly in response to what God has given to us and done for us.

It is a common and helpful practice to use the start of a new year as motivation to set goals and make plans to attain those goals. As Christians, what is our ultimate goal? What did Jesus tell us in Matthew 6:33? "But seek first His kingdom and His righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well." Certainly this is a worthy and all-encompassing goal for us as Christians.

We're also told that goals should be detailed and specific and measurable. How do we satisfy that criteria in light of our main goal to seek God's kingdom?

Let us remember that all we say and do and are should strain toward seeking God's kingdom. That means we'll be busy in the study of His Word and in regular attendance in church where we can hear His Word and receive His Sacraments. It means that we'll be busy about His work of seeking and saving the lost. How is that accomplished?

The Apostle Paul wrote, "You show that you are a letter from Christ... written not with ink but with the Spirit of the living God, not on tablets of stone but on tablets of human hearts" (2 Corinthians 3:3). Jesus put it this way, "Let your light shine before men, that they may see your good deeds and praise your Father in Heaven" (Matthew 5:16). This is what we are – God's letters who reflect the light of Jesus to a world trying to find its way in darkness.

The psalmist commanded, "Sing to the Lord, praise His name; proclaim His salvation day after day. Declare His glory among the nations, His marvelous deeds among all peoples. For great is the Lord and most worthy of praise" (Psalm 96:2-4). In all our words, this should be our goal: to proclaim the goodness, the glory, the greatness of our God.

Then our acts should follow up our attitudes and words. Again Paul's words speak to us: "Bless those who persecute you; Rejoice with those who rejoice; mourn with those who mourn. Live in harmony... Do not repay anyone evil for evil... If it is possible, as far as it depends on you, live at peace with everyone ..." (Romans 12:14ff.). Throughout his letters, Paul urges us to share with those in need, to support those who preach and teach the Word, and to give as we have received.

These are goals worthy of setting and ones we can carry out by "the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, [Who] though He was rich, yet for [our] sakes He became poor, so that [we] through His poverty might become rich" (2 Corinthians 8:9).
